Author's Guide for RIHE Higher Education Forum

1. Article

- Length: preferable length is about 7,000 words excluding figures, tables and references. However, the length should not exceed 10,000 words as a whole (include title, abstract, keywords, figures, tables and references).
- Language: Either British English or American English (spelling and terminology should be followed consistently throughout the article). If English is not your first language, please ask an English-speaking colleague or a professional company to proofread your article.
- Abstract: all articles should include an abstract of 100 150 words.
- Key words: 5 to 10 key words or short phrases in alphabetical order.
- Papers may be submitted in WORD format. To assist you in preparing your paper, we provide formatting template (refer to Sample HEF on website). All accepted articles will be correctly formatted for publication.

Author(s): 13pt, Capital

Sub-Sub-Heading: 12pt, Underlined

Body: 11pt, 4 space indent except the first paragraph

Itemization: 4 space indents

Author, A.A. (2004). Title of chapter. In A. Editor, & B. Editor (Eds.), Title of book (pp. xx–xx). Publisher. https://doi.org/10.1234/....
